
A SACRED GIFT

Human Right to Water

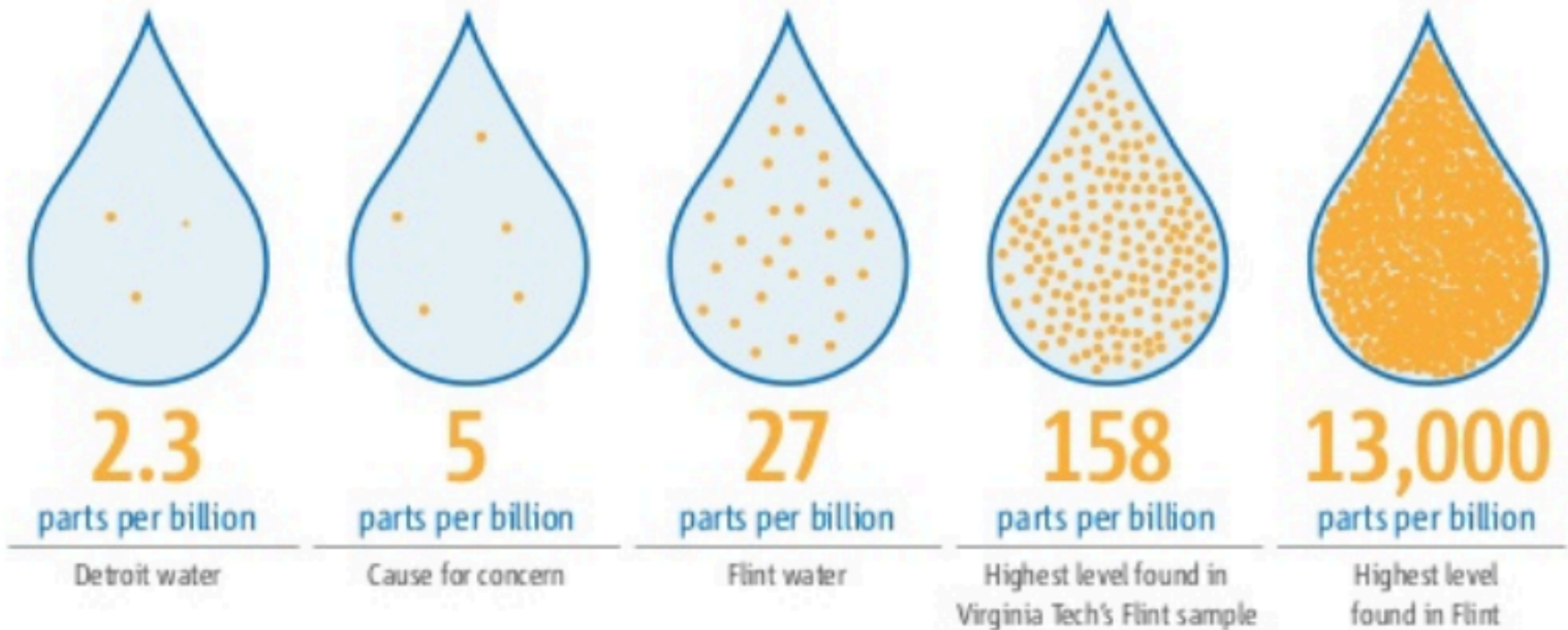
The right to water entitles everyone, without discrimination, to have access to:

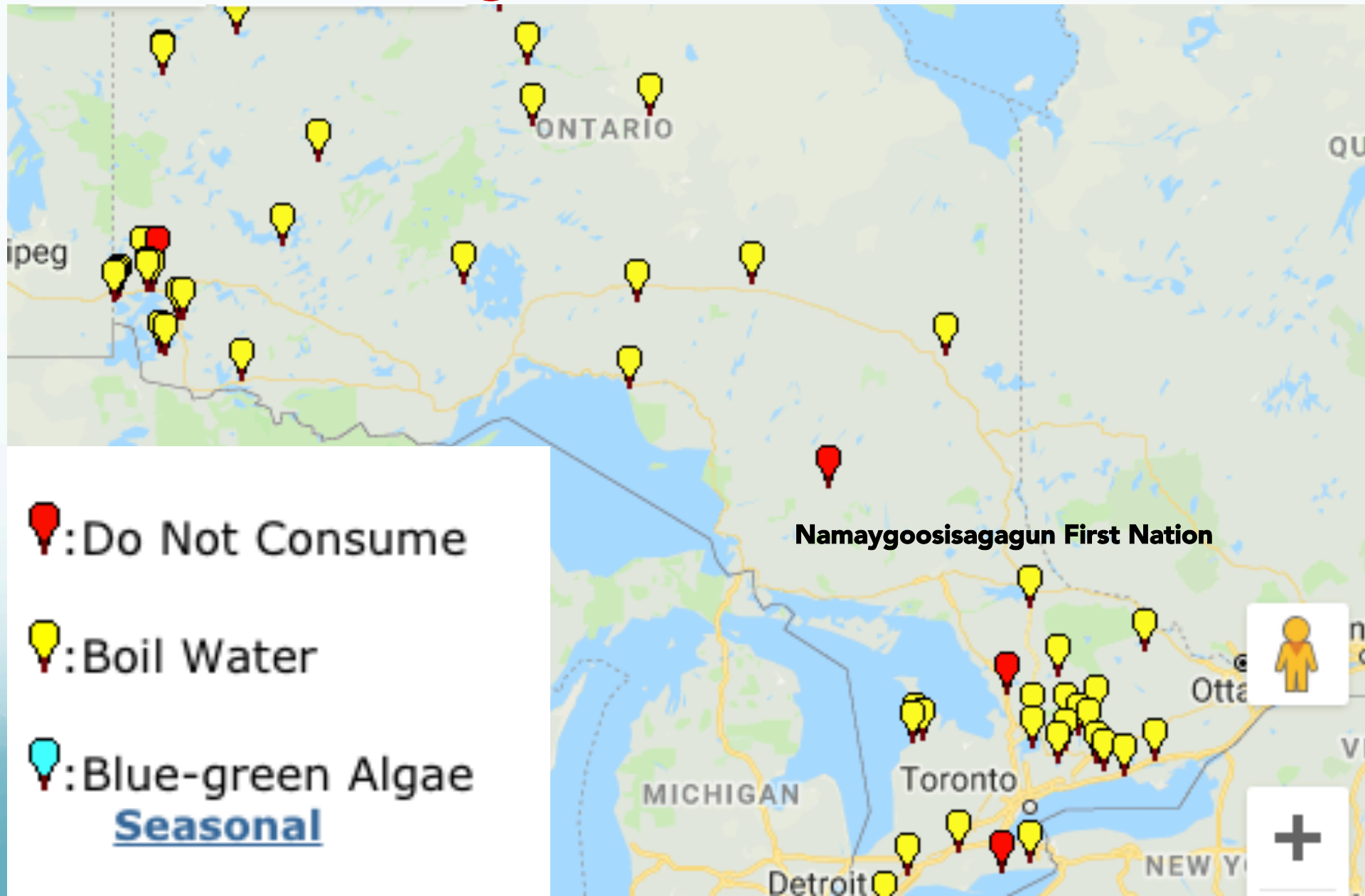
THE KEY PROBLEM

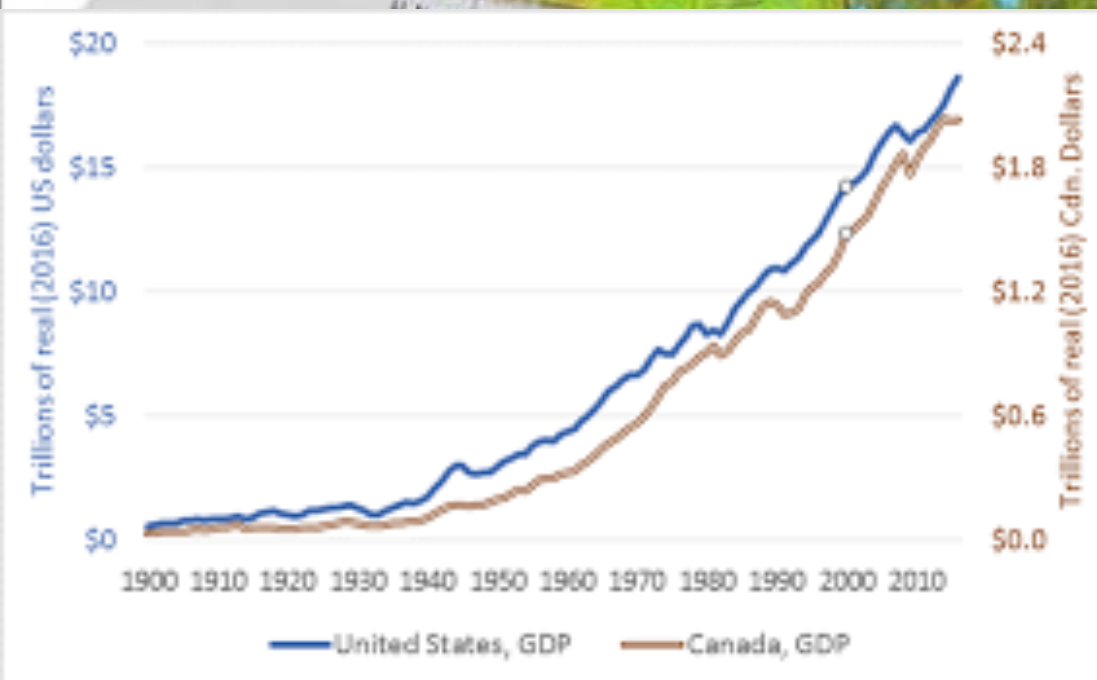
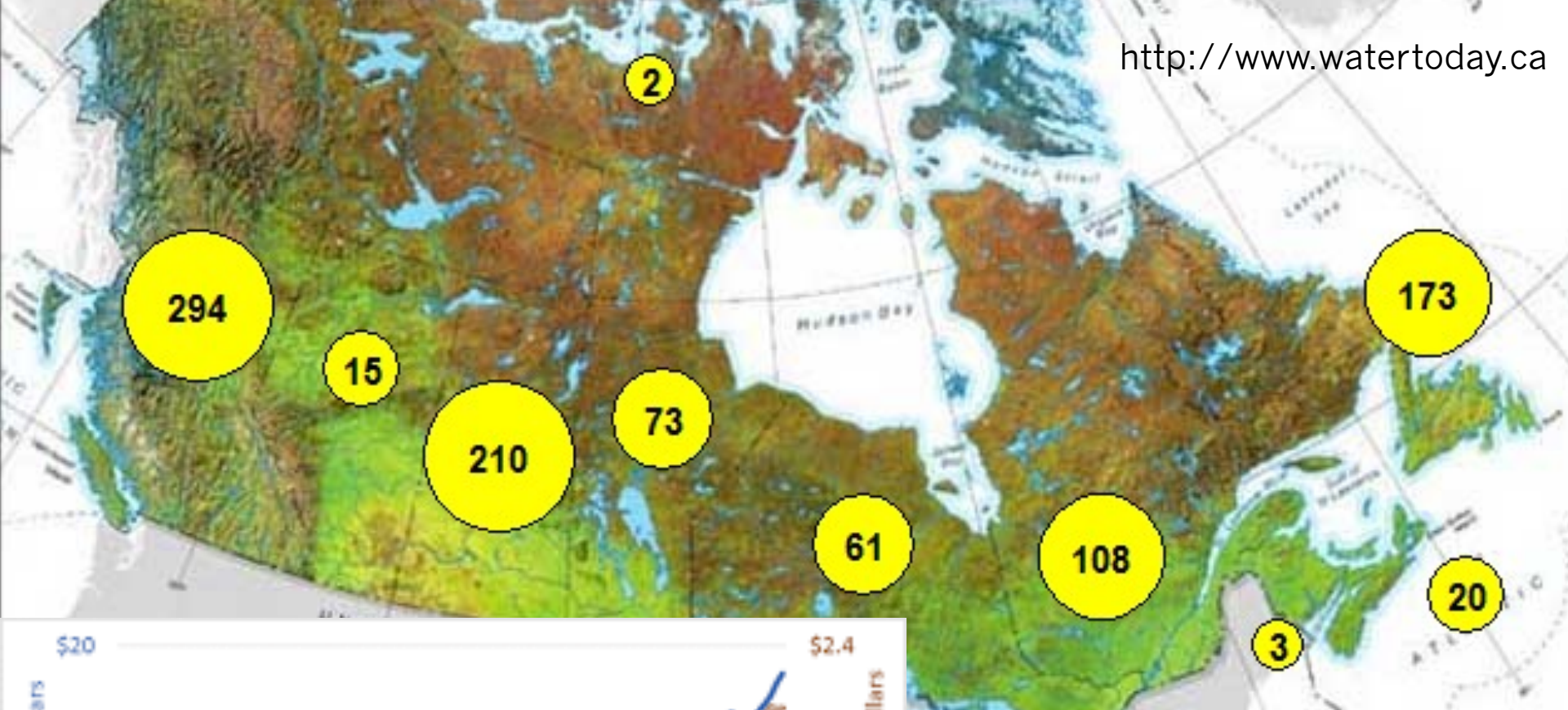
Water from the Flint River is highly corrosive (its water has about 8 times more chloride (Cl^-) in it than Detroit water) to iron and lead. Unfortunately, these pipe materials are widely used throughout Flint.

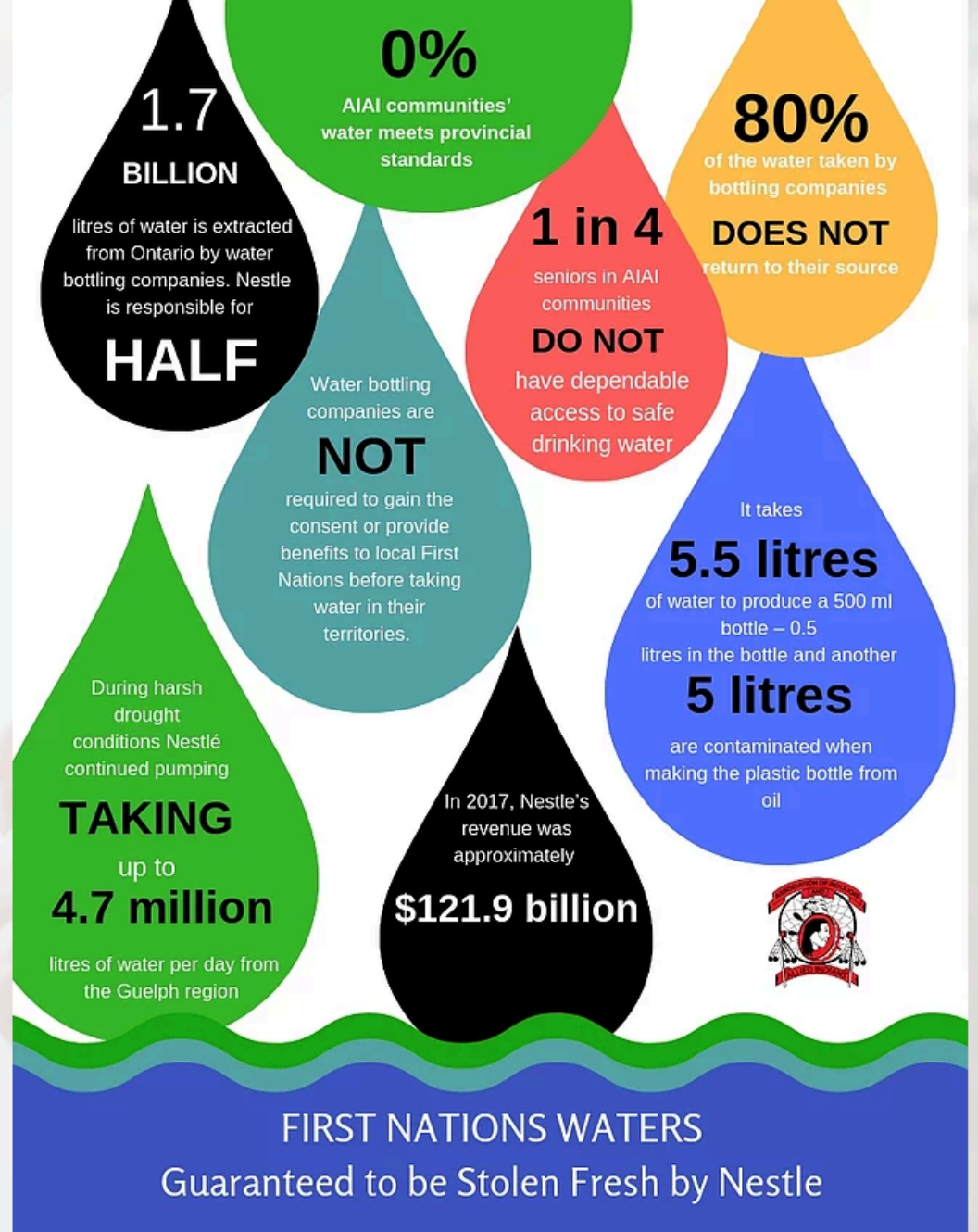



Health Product ?

- Researchers tested **259** bottles of **11** popular bottled water brands for the presence of microscopic plastic. On average, the bottled water tested contained **325** pieces of microplastic per liter
- Only **17** of **259** bottles were found to be free of microplastic particles, and none of the brands tested consistently free of plastic contaminants. The **worst offender was Nestlé Pure Life**, the most contaminated sample of which contained **10,390** particles per liter



"Even as the quality of available water is constantly diminishing, in some places there is a growing tendency, despite its scarcity, to privatize this resource, turning it into a commodity subject to the laws of the market."

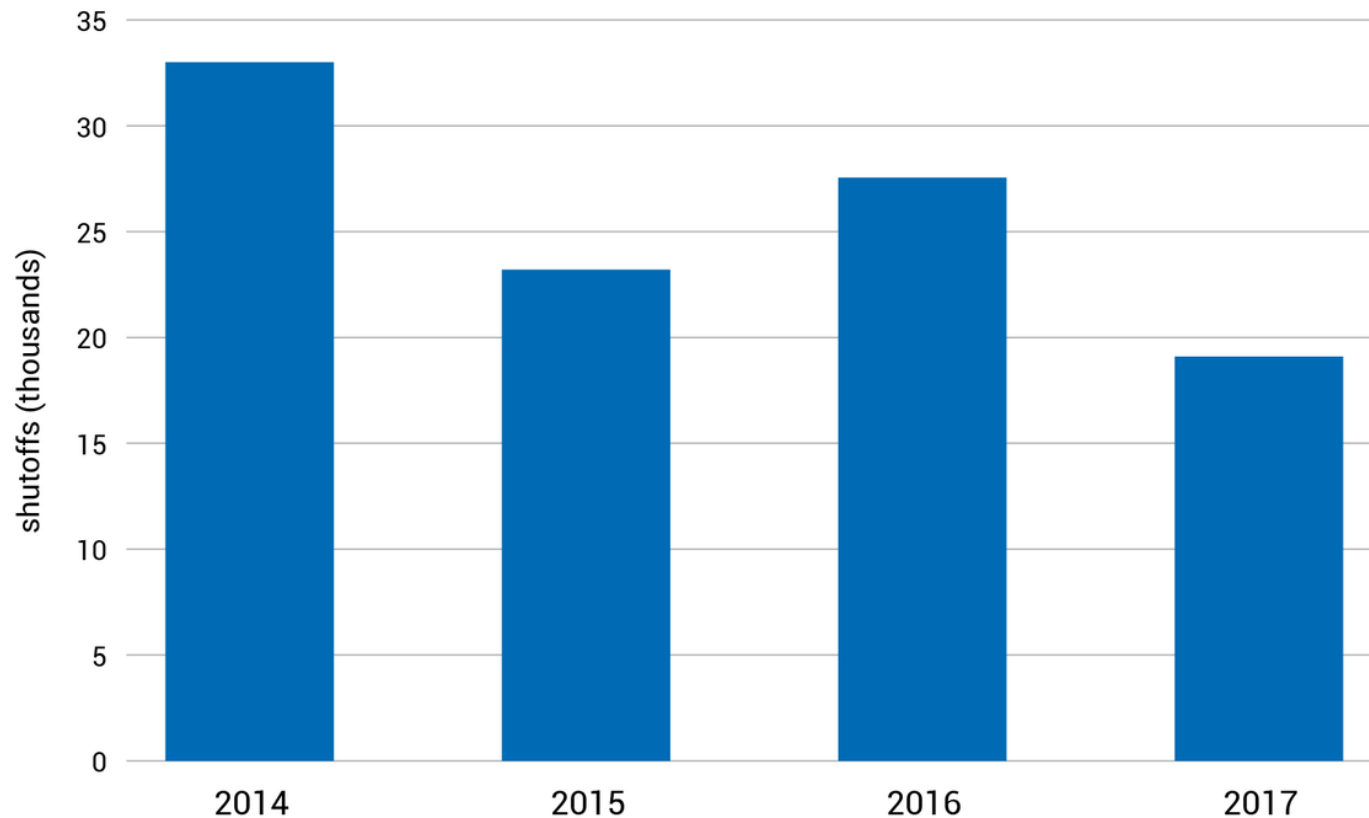

The Cost of Water Commodification

There have been more than 102,000 water shutoffs in Detroit between 2014 and 2017.





Risks of Water Privatization

- **197** billion litres of sewage flushed into Canadian waterways in 2016
- **36%** of wastewater and **29%** of drinking water infrastructure is rated poor/fair condition
- Water infrastructure gap for municipalities. **\$61 billion** (needed) **\$2 billion** (earmarked)
- **4.6 billion** committed by Federal government to end the **100+** DWAs in First Nations communities. But only covers **70%** of total needed investments.
- Market-logic (food and drug examples, Hamilton, Detroit, global examples)

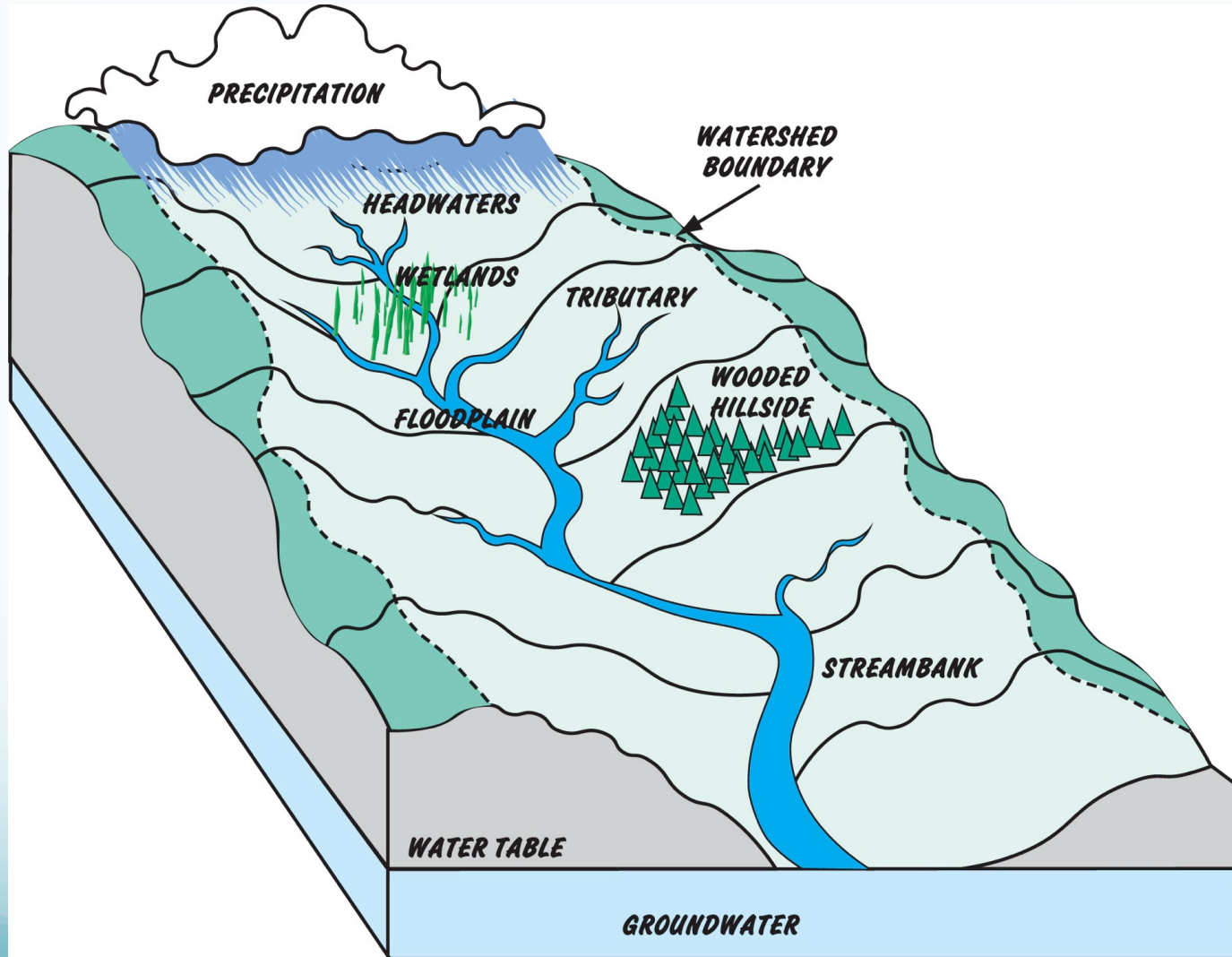

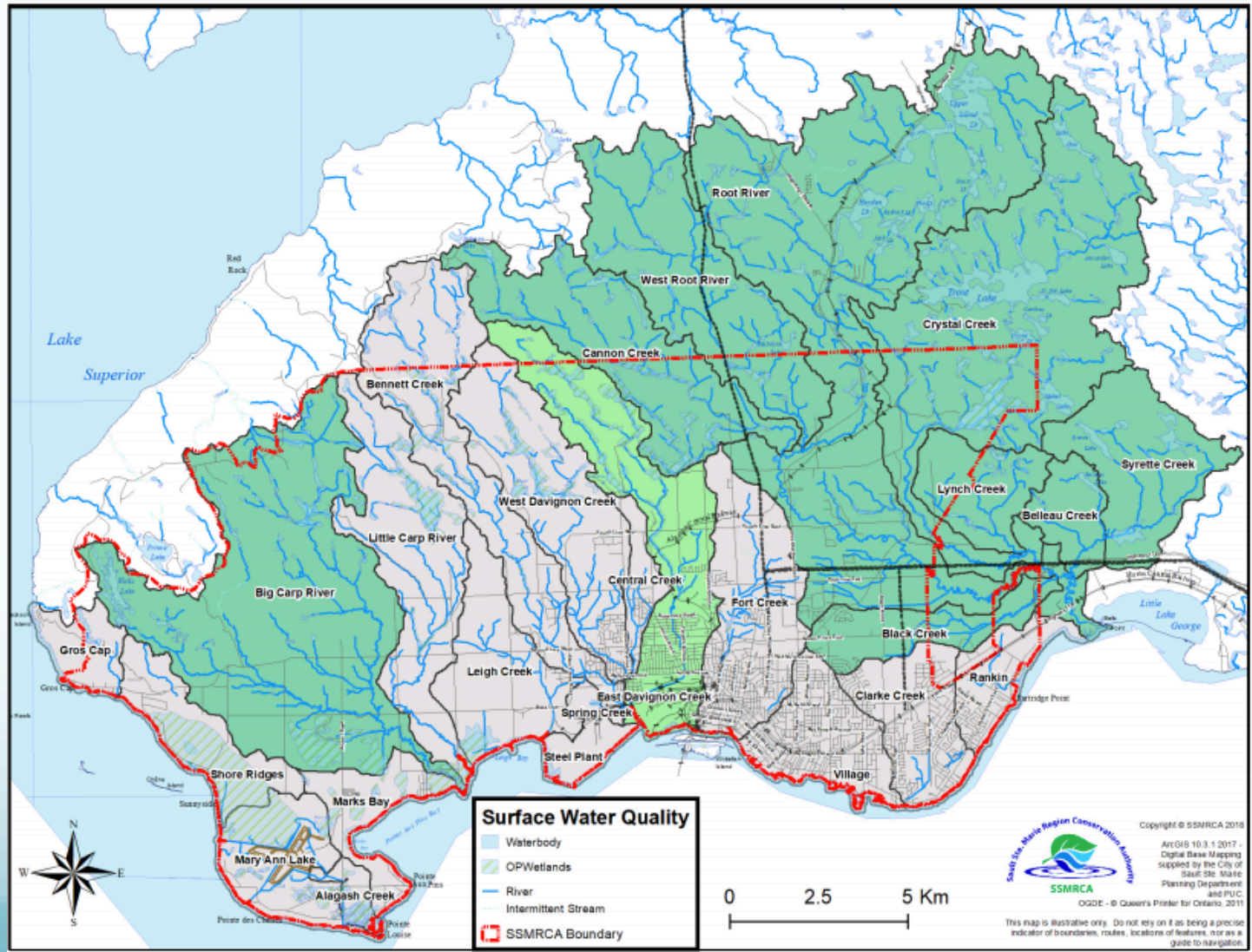

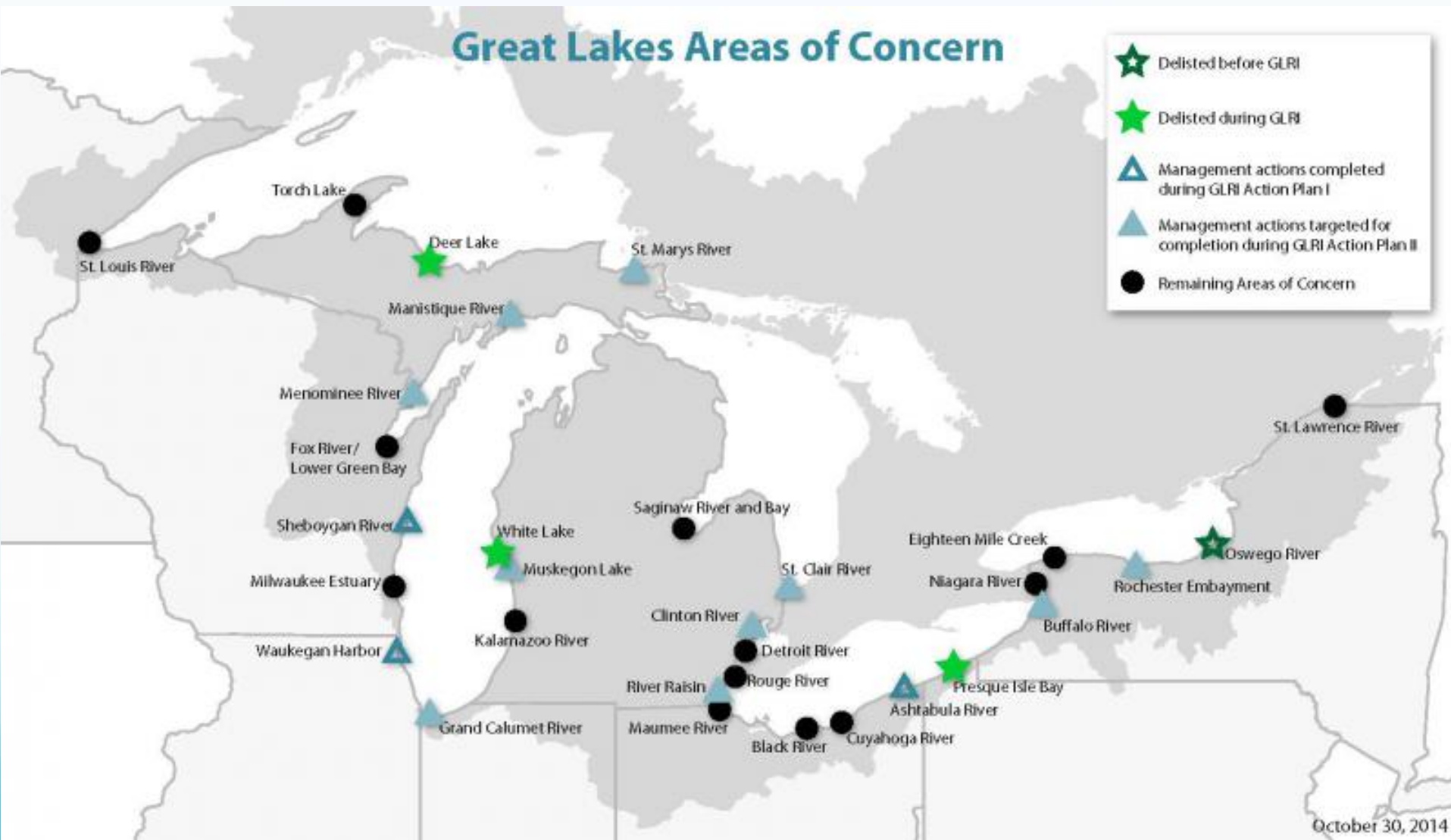

ONLY FACILITIES SPECIFICALLY RELATED TO NUCLEAR POWER GENERATION ARE ON THIS MAP

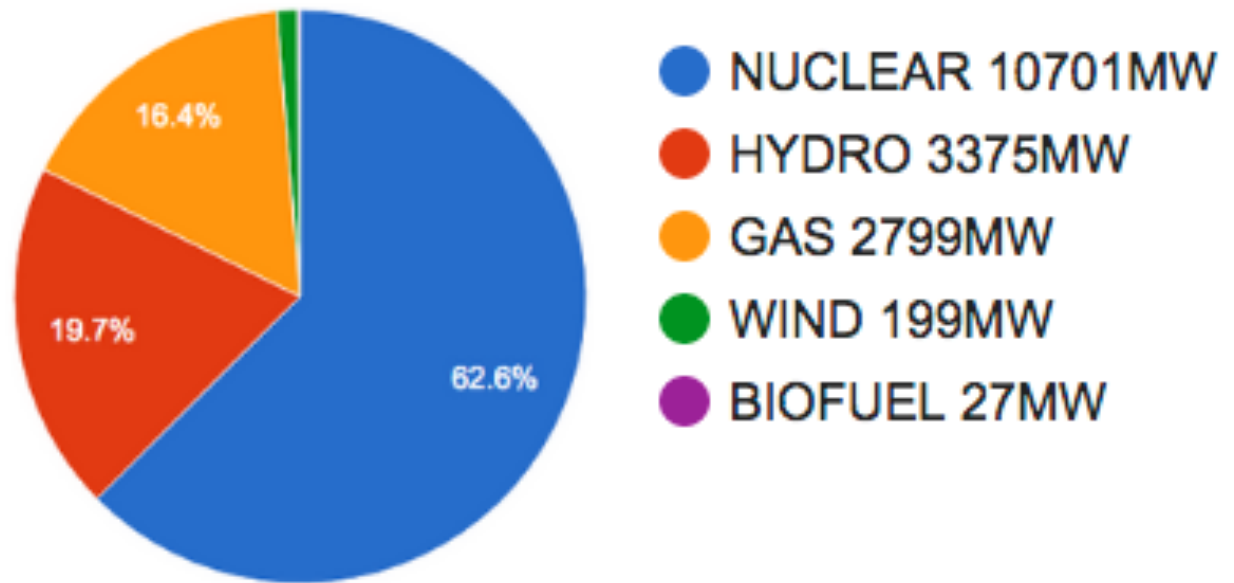

Strategies for Change

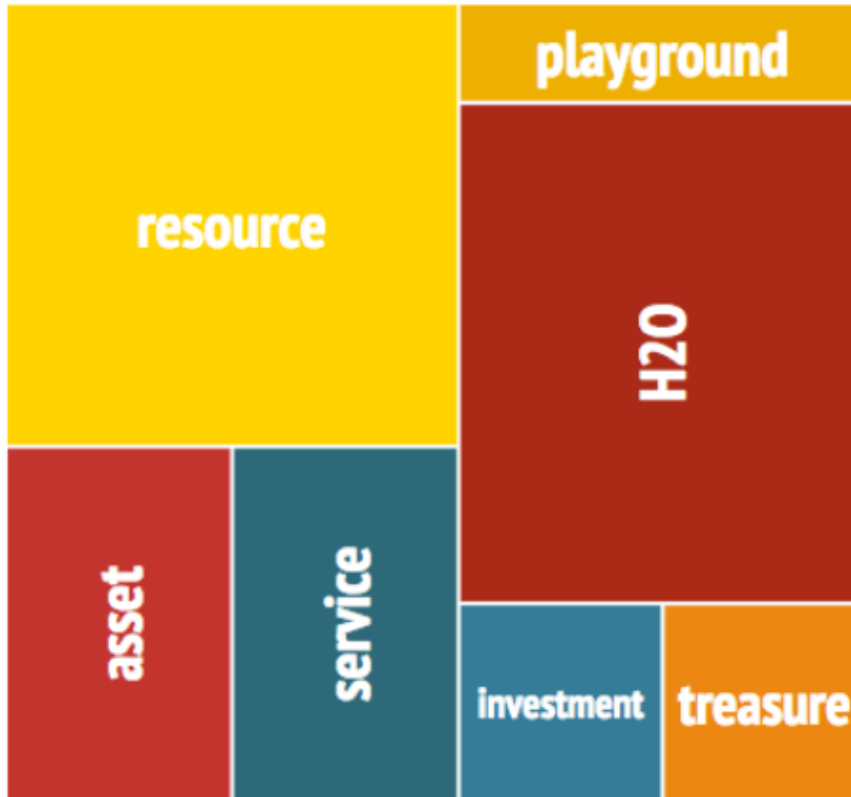
- **Civic:** use our civic / electoral / citizenship powers and institutions
- **Cultural:** use our cultural tools and practices to honour and share our values to wider audiences through education, inspiration, healing, and participation.
- **Economic:** use our consumer and financial powers to boycott and divest from the corporations benefiting from water injustices and pollution
- **Ethical:** use our spiritual, moral, religious, and value-based powers to enrich our public appeals for support and to change the status quo.

Civic Powers

- Getting your municipality to become a Blue Community and/or reduce bottled water and plastics (London, Owen Sound, Ottawa, and Durham examples)
- Supporting Say No to Nestle campaign (Provincial)
- Advocating to end DWAs (Federal)
- Acknowledging and taking action for Canada's Treaty and Indigenous responsibilities
- **CSJ supporting grassroots groups and holding government's accountable**

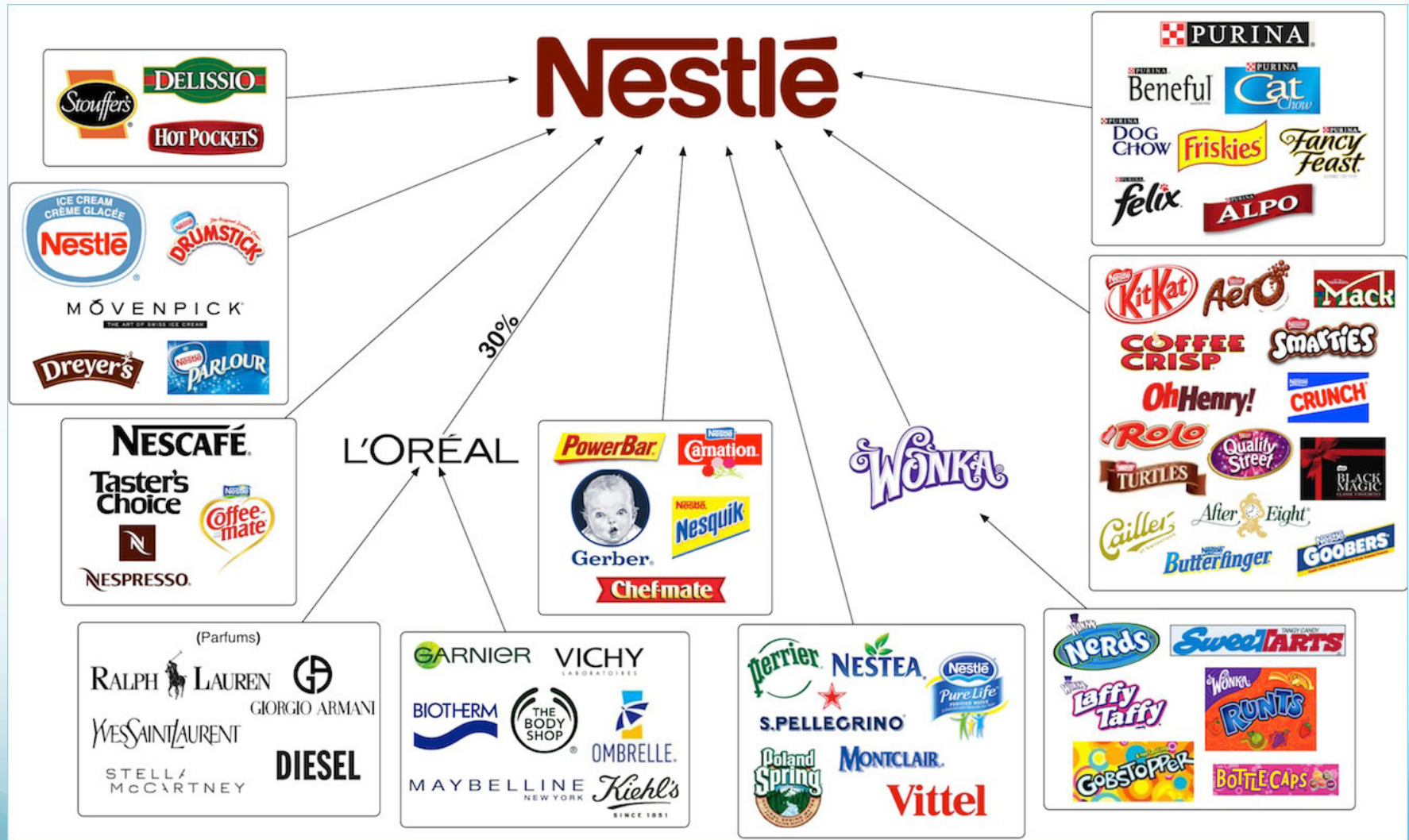
